## The Community Foundation **Supports Operation School Bell**

A \$9,000 Community Impact grant from The Community Foundation will help fund Assistance League of Temecula Valley's main philanthropic program, Operation School Bell, this year. Recently, Assistance League members attended The Community Foundation Reception at the San Bernardino County Museum. Nonprofits who received awards were acknowledged and given the opportunity to briefly speak about their programs.

The Operation School Bell program supplies new clothing to disadvantaged schoolchildren within the Lake Elsinore, Murrieta Valley, Temecula Valley and Menifee school districts. These school districts identify and direct qualified low-income schoolchildren to the program. Children and their families attend local "shopping events" at the Kohl's in Temecula, Murrieta and Menifee and the Target in Lake Elsinore. This year each child will receive \$125 in new school clothing and shoes. Since being adopted in 1989, Operation School Bell has provided new school clothing for over 22,000 low-income students.

"We truly appreciate the funds we from The Community received Foundation," said Dorcas Shaktman, Assistance League president. "This will help us provide 1,700 low-income schoolchildren with new school clothes during the shopping events scheduled for the month of September, October and February.

The Community Foundation is a nonprofit, public benefit corporation serving the residents of Riverside and San Bernardino counties. It provides college scholarships and grants to nonprofit organizations across the two-county area. The Community Foundation is widely recognized for its convening and collaboration-building initiatives that address many of the region's most important quality of life issues.

During the six-day program, students take part in educational activities and presentations and explore relevant sites in West Virginia and Washington, D.C. In addition to examining notable U.S. leaders and historic figures, students study the impact of leader-

ship throughout critical periods of American history including the Civil War and Reconstruction, World War II, the Great Depression and the Civil Rights Movement. Upon completion of JTNYLC, students will have gained a greater sense of the role of individuals in American democracy, as well as the responsibilities of being a leader.

Nicklas says of his six days at the conference, "We visited many landmarks and museums including the Lincoln Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, Harpers Ferry National Historical Park, the Newseum, and the National Museum of American History. My favorite part was spending the night at the Maryland Science Center and learning about President John F. Kennedy. 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
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
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#### **Movie Review**

#### **Pacific Rim**



The sun rises over an eastern city like Tokyo or Shanghai. Everyone starts to enjoy their regular day until they hear the sound of a roar. But this roar is so abnormal, there's no

way that it is coming from the zoo. The roar is heard again and they see a large creature rise from the sea. People run for cover as an unknown monster starts to attack the city. This is the premise for a long forgotten kind of blockbuster, the giant monster movie.

There was once a time when monsters like Godzilla (the famous radioactive reptilian) or King Ghidorah (an ancient three headed dragon) would rule the cinema during the Saturday afternoon matinee. I was born too late to have personally experienced the hour or two of these monster films on the wide screen. Basically, the script depicted destruction of a city as people scurried to safety while the military or maybe another creature battled the monster and ultimately saved the day.

In more recent times, there have been other movies like Godzilla, such as the 1998 American remake or Cloverfield. While these scripts apparently attempted to recreate the dumb but fun feeling of stuff being destroyed by a monster, they seemed to be more focused on showcasing the tragedy of the moment. If a monster destroyed a skyscraper, the movie reminded the audience that hundreds of people had just died. That's not fun. We needed something like *Pacific Rim* to return to the exciting monster movie era.

Pacific Rim is set sometime in the near future where an unknown portal has opened up in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. Monsters, called Kaijus, start to attack the coastal cities. To combat these creatures, humanoid fighting machines are constructed to match the wit and strength of the almost three hundred foot creatures. With two pilots commanding the machines, the plan is a success, though the creatures seem to keep coming. Thus, the war clock is always on and ready for another attack.

Commanding Officer Stacker Pentecost (played by Idris Elba) wants a former pilot, Raleigh Becket (played by Charlie Hunnam), to join him in Hong Kong as they may have finally come up with a solution. Raleigh is called out of retirement, a new command center is set up, and pilots are recruited from around the world to gather for the battle ahead. Among the recruits is Raleigh's new co-pilot, Mako Mori (played by Rinko Kikuchi). The plan is to reach the bridge where the creatures arise from the ocean depths. Yet as time goes on, the monsters have gotten bigger and smarter. An attack on Hong Kong is likely and it's up to the machines to defend the city no matter what.

This seems a lot to take in but I promise that *Pacific Rim* explains everything in simple detail. I was actually able to follow this story very well. A lot of the credit has to go to filmmaker Guillermo Del Toro, who knows how to construct a fun monster movie. He knows how to design a new kind of creature. He knows how to shoot these kinds of movies (the cinematography is amazing). He even pulls off some good character development.

What may surprise everyone is that there are more scenes of dialogue than there are of fighting. Rather than becoming a *Transformers* movie where it is nothing but constant noise for two hours, *Pacific Rim* plays to its strengths by providing background on Raleigh's former pilot experiences and Mako's growth from being Stacker's adopted daughter to a pilot. It's actually very interesting. Plus I also have to mention that Charlie Day and Ron Perlman have roles that completely steal the show.

I wouldn't be surprised if Del Toro acquired a lot of the film's overall look from Japanese anime because *Pacific Rim* has a very colorful appearance. You will enjoy the yellowish-brown command centers, the whiteouts of Alaska, and especially the rainbow neon eye candies of Hong Kong. Whoever helped Del Toro with the imagery deserves an Oscar nomination

I'll give this five Kaiju monsters out of five. *Pacific Rim* is an amazing combination of dumb monster movie fighting blended with a great story. I would love to see this turn into an annual summer franchise. I'll also note that this is a must see in 3D and IMAX.

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

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#### **Alias Movement**

Each month, Arts Council Menifee selects a recipient to be honored as "Artist of the Month". For July, they selected Alias Movement, a repertory and performance dance ensemble.

"Arts Council Menifee has many divisions, one of those being dance. We are blessed to have Alias Movement participate as performing artists at many of our events. They consistently bring a high level of beauty and grace that our audience appreciates," says Bill Zimmerman, Arts Council Menifee's new President.

Artistic directors Alexis Weisbrod and Natalia Morales of the Alias Movement dance company have made it their mission to bring the art of dance to the local community. They want to showcase the abundance of talent that resides here and, more importantly, celebrate the role of dance as an artistic discipline.

Since the dance company's formation in 2011, they have performed throughout San Diego and Riverside counties. The dancers have shown their talents at the prestigious, invitation-only Choreographer's Festival" for the last two consecutive years, at Art Council Menifee's annual "Menifee's Got Talent" event, as well as several dance concerts at Mt. San Jacinto College.

The Alias Movement also produces a full-length concert every year to present their repertory to the community.

Weisbrod and Morales serve as Associate Faculty members for the dance program at Mt. San Jacinto College. After meeting each other at the college, they developed the dance company and named it Alias Movement.

"To some extent having a studio has always been a dream," says Weisbrod. "It was something we often discussed, but usually not seriously, because we didn't have the resources to follow it through."

After teaming up with Preet Mutneja, their third partner for the dance center, the two artistic directors were able to make their dreams a reality by opening the Alias Movement Center. Its slogan is "Discover the Joy of Dance".

"We really believe in dance as an important art form because it uses the one thing that all people have in common, the human body," says Weisbrod.

She continues, "We tell so much of our personal and cultural histories through our body, whether we intend to or not. Dance has the power to highlight this and create performative moments or movement experiences from which people can learn and begin to understand the world or the life of another person."

The Alias Movement stands out among other dance companies in the Inland Empire because of its dedication to display diversity to every audience for whom they perform. They are a multidisciplinary group that aims to create skilled and knowledgeable dancers who are well-versed in various genres, including modern, contemporary, jazz and hip hop. The dancers themselves also illustrate the importance of diversity. The dancers have widely-varying background and training experiences, but they are all fully-embraced.

"The most exhilarating and moving part of dance is that it can utilize all the arts. At its base, dance is a visual, aural, physical experience. People typically think of dance as using music, and it often does, but it can also use literary arts for example either as inspiration or even as direct sound accompaniment" says Weisbrod.

At the core of this dance company lies two missions:

1) To bring dance into the community by creating an artistic space for professional and pre-professional dancers to learn and grow.

2) To be seen as the "go to place" where audiences can experience high caliber



## New Grant Funding Available Support Services Needed for Grandparents Raising Grandchildren

The Riverside County Children & Families Commission plans to provide up to \$750,000 in grant funds to support quality child care and respite services for Riverside County grandparents raising grandchildren. The Commission has issued a request for proposal (RFP). The Commission is seeking proposals to provide support and help mitigate adverse impacts among Riverside County families where grandparents are raising one or more grandchildren, 0 through age 5. Grant funding will be awarded over two and a half years to support services starting Jan. 1, 2014.

Providing developmentally appropriate social and learning opportunities during the early years of a child's life helps children build a foundation for success in school and beyond. Yet raising a young grandchild can create multiple barriers, including limited access to resources.

There are more than 30,000 grandparents that have grandchildren 18 years old and younger living with them in Riverside County, according to the latest U.S. Census Bureau American

Community Survey. Of those, 18 percent are under the age of six.

## **Arts Council Menifee Art Institute**

Arts Council Menifee concluded its Summer Youth Art Institute for 2013 with a special reception. Over 450 people turned to view the budding artist's creations that were on display - this was a clear indication of how much the families appreciated the value of this program. The young artists' enthusiasm and pride in their accomplishments lit up the school that evening.

Last year ACM taught 70 children. This year the program taught almost 400 young people, from age 5 to 12, the basics of art. They learned how to mix colors, use various media, draw with perspective, try

self-portraits and much more. They each went home with new-found skills and a fresh set of art supplies, all of which they will use for years. This community effort partially fills the unfortunate gap in art instruction created by ongoing school budget cuts.

The City of Menifee supported this program with a Community Development Block Grant of \$10,000 approved in 2012. Southern California Edison contributed a very helpful \$2,000. Assistance League Temecula Valley was also very generous, donating \$2,000 in arts supplies.

# Local Democrats Take Formal Stand on Major Issues

The Riverside County Democratic Party formally declared positions on three current issues impacting people. They opposed using social security as a "bargaining chip," opposed the use of genetically engineered foods (GMOs), and endorsed issues related to gun safety.

Citing the critical dependence of senior citizens, surviving spouses, veterans and the disabled on the modest benefits social security provides, Democrats pointed out that the cost of such benefits are part of neither the federal budget nor the national debt. They also opposed modifying the index by using a "Chained Consumer Price Index" because it would directly and unjustifiably reduce needy American's choices for food, healthcare and other basic needs.

They also went on record against GMO's (genetically modified organisms), reporting that many developed nations (including the European Union, the United Kingdom, Australia, Japan and two dozen others) have already banned their use, based upon scientific studies that showed reduced longevity among the animals that were fed GMO food.

Local Democrats noted U.S. citizens own 300,000,000 guns—highest per capita in the world— thus explaining why gun-related accidents and deaths happen more often in the U.S. than in any other country in the world. They endorsed a ban of further manufacture, sale and possession of military-type assault weapons, and strongly declared their support for background checks and a waiting period for prospective gun purchasers. They also opposed high capacity magazines and guns capable of using them.

Their positions, formalized as Resolutions, have been officially forwarded to the California Democratic Party, the National Democratic Party, the Governor of California, the state Attorney General, all Democrats in the state legislature, every Democratic member of California's delegation to Congress and the President of the United States.

#### **Coyote Hazing - Protect Your Pets**

Residents are havng a problem with coyotes encroaching their homes and the city of Temecula reports that coyotes are encroaching on parks as well. Pets have been nabbed in their own yard, some rescued although with injury and some not lucky enough to have survived.

Animal Friends of the Valleys provided the following information to help you protect your home and pets.

Generally, coyotes are reclusive animals who avoid human contact. Coyotes who have adapted to urban and suburban environments, however, may realize there are few real threats and may approach people or feel safe visiting yards even when people are present. These coyotes have become habituated (lost their fear of humans), probably owing to the bounty of food that they have become accustomed to feeding upon in your neighborhood. These bold coyotes should not be tolerated or enticed but instead given the clear message that they should not be so brazen. Never run away from a coyote!

Hazing is a method that makes use of deterrents to move an animal out of an area or discourage an undesirable behavior or activity. Hazing can help maintain a coyote's fear of humans and deter them from backyards and play spaces.

The simplest method of hazing a coyote involves being loud and large:

• Stand tall, wave your arms, and yell at

the coyote, approaching him if necessary, until he runs away.

• If a coyote has not been hazed before, he may not immediately run away when you yell at him. If this happens, you may need to walk towards the coyote and increase the intensity of your hazing.

• The coyote may run away, but then stop after a distance and look at you. It is important to continue to go after the coyote until he completely leaves the area.

You may need to use different tactics, such as noisemakers, stomping your feet, or spraying the coyote with a hose, to get him to leave.

The following guidelines have proven very successful at correcting problematic coyote behavior, both short and long term. Using a variety of different hazing tools is critical so that coyotes don't get used to redundant or single stimulus devices, sounds, and actions.

- Noisemakers: Voice, whistles, air horns, bells, "shaker" cans full of marbles or pennies, pots, lids, or pie pans banged together.
- Projectiles: sticks, small rocks, cans, tennis balls, rubber balls.
- Other: hoses, water guns with vinegar water, spray bottles with vinegar water, pepper spray, bear repellent.

Remember, keeping pets and pet food inside is the best way to keep coyotes out of your yard.

#### **Cashew Chicken**

- 3 skinless chicken breasts 1/4 cup vegetable oil 3/4 cup chicken broth
- 1/4 cup soy sauce 2 Tbl. cornstarch
- 2 pkg frozen pea pods (6 oz ea)
- 1/2 lb. sliced mushrooms
- 2 cans sliced bamboo shoots (6 oz ea)
- 2 cups cashews
- 4 green onions, sliced 1" lengths
- 2 cups rice cooked

- 1. Cut chicken into 1" pieces. Heat oil in a large skillet. Add chicken and fry until white.
- 2. Combine chicken broth, soy sauce and cornstarch in a bowl. Add sauce to cooked chicken.
- 3. Stir in pea pods and mushrooms. Simmer, covered 2 minutes.
- 4. Stir in bamboo shoots and simmer 1 more minute.
- 5. Stir in onions and cashews. Simmer 5 more minutes. Serve over cooked rice.
